SUMMARY OF ARTICLES AND BYLAWS

Membership

Article VII of the Articles of Incorporation provides that "any individual, firm, association, corporation, partnership or other organization or any individual acting as an accredited representative of any firm, association, corporation, partnership or other organization may become a member in this Association by applying for a membership certificate***agreeing to purchase from the Association the amount of electric energy***and agreeing to comply with and be bound by these Articles of Incorporation, the Bylaws of the Association, and such rules and regulations***. Husband and wife may jointly become a member***. (If two individuals hold a joint membership together they shall be jointly entitled to one (1) vote***.)"

Annual Meeting

Bylaw II of the Bylaws provides that "An Annual Meeting of the members shall be held between August 1 and November 1 of each year with the exact date to be set by the Board of Directors." Article VIII, Section 3 of the Articles of Incorporation indicates that the members shall be "entitled to receive ten (10) days written notice of the time and place of all meetings and of the purpose of all special meetings."

Directors

Article IX of the Articles of Incorporation provides that "the Board of Directors shall be made up of (9) members of the Cooperative. The Directors serve for a three-year term. Each year the terms of three Directors expire on the date of the Annual Meeting."

Nominations and Election of Directors by the Members

Article IX of the Articles of Incorporation indicates—"There shall be four (4) numbered geographic districts***. Two Directors representing each district and one serving at large. Candidates for election to the Board of Directors shall be nominated by a nominating committee***. Any fifty (50) or more members may make other nominations***. The election of Directors shall be by ballot and each voting member shall be entitled to cast one (1) vote for each Director to be elected."

SEVERE STORM DAMAGE

The strong thunderstorms that hit eastern Iowa August 3 created extended power outages for a large number of members throughout northern Jones County and Jackson County. High winds brought numerous lines down as poles snapped and trees toppled. The number of consumer outage hours during that one night were greater than the whole month of July. Many customers were out of power for more than 12 hours as linemen diligently worked through the night. We appreciated the patience and understanding of all the affected members as we dealt with Mother Nature's wrath.

This power outage allowed us to see the value in the outage management software we have installed. With all the outages projected on the wall it quickly showed us which areas had the most members off line and where to concentrate linemen in a faster, more efficient manner.

SWISS FORESIGHT CREATES OUR NATURE HERITAGE

You have to thank the early Swiss immigrants when you're taking advantage of going back to nature at the Swiss Valley Nature Preserve. The preserve is one of the attractions offered by the Dubuque County Conservation Board. It's located off Highway 151 between Cascade and Dubuque, reached by turning north onto Old Military Road and then turning left for about 3 miles until you reach 13768 Swiss Valley Road.

The early Swiss immigrants, when arriving here in 1830, aptly named the area "Swiss Valley" because it reminded them of their Alpine homeland. Treating the area with respect, the trees were not removed from land which they would not be utilizing for their livelihood. The first grist mill in Iowa was built in 1834 on Catfish Creek. According to historic records, the grist mill was so popular that flour from St. Louis was driven off the markets. Only the foundation remains today. The dike gave way during a storm sending a great wall of water downstream toward Rockdale. The dike and mill pond area was located in Catfish Creek, directly below where the Nature Center is now located.

The first military road in Iowa was built in March of 1839, along what is now old 151, which assisted in development of the area. The unique land ethic of the Swiss farmers of preserving the forested areas has resulted in a stand of nearly virgin forest which is now the home of the 476 acres of the Swiss Valley Nature Preserve. Thus, nature enthusiasts have the early Swiss settler to thank for a unique foray into nature. There are about 10 miles of hiking trails, each named and labeled as you traverse the area.


When you arrive at the Preserve, a map is available describing the 8 trails with names such as Woodland Ecology, Mature Forest, Bluebird, Yellowbud and Prairie Trail. These trails are the result of the work accomplished after the Conservation Board acquired the land in 1973. Visitors are certain to be impressed by the exceptional scenic, awe-inspiring beauty of the area. It's kinda like a forest-covered Grand Canyon.

At the present time, the Preserve building is being renovated and enlarged. The old part of the building was a dairy barn, originally on the property. Offices are located here, as well as the original

nature center. Two years ago, in September 2002, using REAP (Resource Enhancement and Protection) funds the project began. REAP is funded in part by the Iowa legislature to improve the city, county and state parks, fish and wildlife, soil and water conservation, historic resources, roadside vegetation management and environmental education. Thus when you visit the Swiss Valley Nature Preserve, it's a great display of your money at work.

Already the new unfinished rooms are being used for teacher groups, summer classes and meeting places. Scout groups, clubs and visitors abound to see the exhibits. Many descendants of the original settlers come. There is a cemetery of long ago settlers at the nearby Swiss Valley Park. Here campers are welcomed to the area.

in the preserve. The REC is funding an energy display on the second floor, which at first glance looks like a playhouse. It contains interactive displays where visitors can see energy efficient home construction ideas including insulation, lighting, geothermal, windows and landscaping. Equipped with a computer to walk you through details of energy efficient options, this home will be a valuable learning tool for all. The Cooperative also assisted Swiss Valley with their geothermal installation.

It's taken lots of cooperation. Brian Preston, Naturalist, has worked diligently to achieve the final outcome. An Iowa Museum Curator, calling himself a Muselogist, has been contracted to arrange displays. "Jazz them up" is the terminology used. Robert Walton, the Executive Director, has spent long hours, along with the Dubuque County Conservation Board to accomplish their goal. An additional fee of \$1.00 for each 50 kWh block will be added to your monthly energy bill.

This program does not guarantee renewable energy will be delivered directly to your premise, however it does



assure the amount of renewable energy you purchase will be purchased by the Cooperative first from approved generators on the Cooperative's electrical system and then from the Cooperative's power supplier, CIPCO, for delivery into the electrical system.


